The Rector's Report

Each year when I sit down to write my annual report, I remind myself that I'm not just writing for the current year but also for the parish twenty, fifty, even one hundred years hence. What would the parish like to know about us decades from now? Perhaps, more importantly, what could we tell them that would aid them in their ministry?

Looking back at this year, likely the first topic that will come to mind is the financial crisis in the United States and worldwide. The stock market's decline set off shock waves not only in industry but in the non-profit and church world as well. If anything, the churches and the non-profits took the hardest hit of all. To be sure, we have reports from around the country that some churches' stewardship actually improved over the past year. Still for the most part, and especially in Southern California, decline was the rule. Some church budgets declined fifteen, twenty or thirty percent this past year. We too suffered the blow; long-time supporters found they had to lower their pledges and other support. Still, with discipline and the employment of some real economies, the staff and Vestry brought the Church to a balanced budget at year's end. We have built a budget with lower anticipated income next year but it's my sincere hope and belief that, if the economy returns, so too will the charitable support of our parishioners. Throughout the coming year, the Vestry and staff will keep the parish apprised of our efforts.

This past year, we experienced the beginning of what will likely be a tidal change in parish communications. As the year progressed, we shifted more and more of our

communications to digital means. Not only do we save money on paper, printing and staff time, we've made our reports more timely and useful. The weekly email to the parish has become one of our most popular communication efforts. We as staff and parish leadership see that venture expanding. The national church will undergird some of these efforts. This year, the national church intends to begin preparing a Sunday bulletin pre-designed for each parish in the church. I want to emphasize how important this shift to digital communications is by an example; when the staff asked ourselves how many of us had picked up a telephone directory to look for something over the past years, almost no one had--nearly everyone had turned to their computer or smart phone. Change will come fast in this area and it behooves us who are responsible for sharing the Good News to stay on top of that change.

Three other topics come to mind that also signal welcome growth in our spiritual lives: the maturing of our Eventide liturgy on Wednesdays, our Godly Play program and Outreach. Long ago in the 18th century, when the first American Prayer Book was printed, it was printed with an

introduction that reminded the membership that from time to time, certain changes would need to be made to the liturgy to reflect the customs of the time. The Eventide liturgy has grown by picking up important elements of traditional worship and combining them with music that people experience as both ancient and modern; we have a full worship experience. I'm delighted to report that the liturgy has slowly grown over time and has become a model for other churches in our area.

I'm happy to report our efforts in Sunday school and particularly in Godly Play, have not only helped our children to become biblically literate people but also Godly Play has had an encouraging influence on our liturgies. The early Christmas Eve liturgy, Maundy Thursday and Easter Vigil have all been shaped by our care and concern for our children. We couldn't ask for better support from the adult members of our parish.

This past year, our Outreach efforts have really flourished, nourished both as a line item in the parish budget and by special fund-raising efforts. The goal of the Church's Outreach Committee has been to make the outreach experience as much "hands on" as can possibly be for our parish. Due to many successful efforts, particularly with Peoples' Self-Help Housing but other organizations as well,

we can say we've made an impact from our faith. Our M-4 program has been truly remarkable. Ecumenical efforts like ours are so rare that we've drawn note from a national figure for our work. Backpacks, AIDS kits and water wells have been some of our gifts to the rest of the world. The gift to us has been thriving faith formation.

The year ahead, as the Senior Warden has reported, is full of promise. This coming year will be a year when we pay particular attention to faith formation. This coming year will also require planning from the Vestry. We have growing infrastructure issues to face—a fading organ, for example, and continued efforts to create a columbarium. But those lie before us; today we can celebrate the ministry of all the saints gathered at All Saints by the Sea.

Senior Warden's Report

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Last year at this time, we talked about how, in almost every way, All Saints by-the-Sea was flourishing. We discussed a clear sense of our mission, an abundance of new ministries and programs, and a superb clergy and lay staff. The one area of concern was our finances in the difficult economic environment.

Well, 2009 turned out a bit better than we had expected. We did not start significant new programs but rather took the year to let what had been started in recent years mature, and that went well. We made some adjustments to our personnel and financial operating policies and procedures, which are proving to be helpful. And the finances worked out better than expected; thanks mainly to careful spending by clergy and staff, we had essentially a zero deficit rather than the \$100,000 or so we had budgeted.

Looking forward, I see two main challenges for us. One has to do with our direction, and the other is about money.

Now that we have largely digested the many new initiatives of recent years (Centering Prayer; Healing Prayer; Godly Play; Eventide; Rwanda Connection; Gifts of Grace; new Outreach infrastructure, new Friendship Center relationship, and others), it is time to consider what next. We ought to do that thoughtfully, and several years ago the Vestry worked out a compelling view of who we are and what we do. We are at the core about doing three things well: teaching ourselves and others about God and His Son, so that we might have faith (known these days as formation); worshipping together as the body of Christ, so our faith is nurtured and grows; and expressing our faith by loving and caring for one another, within our parish and beyond (Outreach). Jeff will have

much more to say about this and how we use the framework to guide us, you'll soon have a nifty blue pin which embodies these concepts.

Our other, more difficult challenge is about money. It seems quite unlikely that we will be able to avoid a deficit of around \$100,000 this year. We have enough endowment to live with this for a year or two, but unless our giving gets back on a growth path sometime soon, the Vestry will have to view the deficit as structural, make some painful adjustments and certainly not be able to fund new or expanded initiatives.

This is a hard subject to discuss because I know that many here continue to respond so generously in this environment; some are dedicated tithers, some who were able have upped their giving, and some have been really devastated by the downturn and had to cut back. That said, for those of us who have choices, have flexibility, I ask you to look favorably on All Saints as you struggle with those choices.

And we do struggle on several fronts. There is the struggle between the Christian imperative to be generous and that fear which is so much in the air today of some day coming up short in meeting our own financial needs. There is the struggle


between living more simply and living large. And there is the struggle to sort out all the ways we can support God's work in the world today.

On this last point, the role of All Saints in our total giving, I ask you to consider this. This is the place where we and many others learn about God and how important it is to love one another and to be generous. This is the place where we come each week to be renewed and refreshed in our commitment to walk in the way of Christ. And this is the place that provides so many ways for us to become personally involved with helping others.

Many thanks to our Vestry, all of our staff and all

of you for your help and support, and especially to my close associates in this adventure, Jeff Bullock and Sheri Benninghoven. I am honored to have served as your Senior Warden and to have been able to work with such fine people.

Stewardship Report



In the Stewardship Program begun last Fall for 2010 pledges, we used for the fourth year an approach based on the “New Consecration Sunday” plan, but customized to suit our church and our community. This year the theme was “Preparing the Abundant Table”, continuing the focus on God’s unconditional love for us and the spiritual benefits of giving back a portion of what we have.

Many thanks to those parishioners who testified about their own stewardship this year; virtually every expert on stewardship agrees that these personal statements are the most important part of any stewardship campaign. And thanks to the Vestry, spouses and other volunteers who helped with the breakfast on Celebration Sunday.

The Vestry, led by stewardship chairs Sheri Benninghoven and Dave Buchanan, served as the stewardship committee. There are a lot of “moving parts” to a stewardship campaign, and thanks to the vestry and especially to Sheri and Dave for an excellent job.

2009 was the first full year for our new book-keeper Betty Tapscott and new accounting software (QuickBooks), and as

part of these changes we are now more carefully tracking pledges and related income as distinct from “gifts for current use” – gifts intended to be used for operations but not related to specific pledges. This means that year to year pledge income comparisons won’t be useful until we build some history with the new procedures. However, we can say that:

As of year-end, we had received 264 pledges for \$820,000. We estimate that with some additional pledges in coming months, we will actually receive about \$850,000 in pledge income over the year.

Adding in about \$100,000 in estimated gifts for current use, we expect to have a total of about \$950,000 from these two sources for operations. This is up from \$916,000 in 2009, although 2009 was down from the prior year.

All in all, considering the economic environment, the campaign went about as well as we could expect. Thanks to all for your help and support.

A Report from The Rev. Rob Fisher

This year was a year of solidification and growth for me and for my various ministries at All Saints.

The year began with a new dynamic, having a second associate priest “up and running.” During the summer, Rev. Liz and I stepped up our efforts, along with the leadership of the vestry and others, as we kept All Saints running smoothly during Father Jeff’s sabbatical and then sick leave after his unfortunate bike accident. We were all grateful for his recovery and return in September.

Toni McDonald and Roy Martinez served loyally as youth leaders with me through the end of the ‘08-’09 academic year, and then decided to step back at least temporarily just as Alex Smith was emerging as a committed leader and collaborator. Alex came in with fresh ideas, a natural gift for connecting with young people, and a deep sense of her own spirituality which she is able to readily share with others. She and I developed a collaborative relationship, and together we re-thought many aspects of our youth program.

We sought to address challenges of attendance and community-building in light of the busy schedules of our families. Instead of monthly gatherings, we switched to weekly, event-driven meetings. We also decided to combine high schoolers with junior high schoolers to increase numbers. The events we have been planning during this academic year have been intentionally varied from week to week, including fun events, service-oriented events, special guest speakers (such as surf legend Shaun Tomson), thought-provoking discussion, and worship (especially compile out of the prayerbook with guitar whenever we get the chance to meet late at night).

Happily, we kicked off the fall term with a bang, having a beach bonfire down the street from the church, and following that soon after with an overnight “lock-in” in the Parish Hall.

We gave the youth group a special name, “Four:12,” which comes from a reference to 1 Timothy 4:12 “Let no one despise your youth, but

set the believers an example in speech and conduct, in love, in faith, in purity.”

The attendance has solidified, yet it still fluctuates from week to week. At its greatest it has been twenty-three, and at its lowest it has been five. Though it is difficult to measure, we sense a steady increase taking place in the bonds shared among the group. Our goal for the youth program, ultimately, is about building relationships both among the young people themselves as well as across generations, and to form a Christian community of agape love, acceptance, support, and shared prayer. As I leave All Saints, Alex has agreed to carry on the torch at least for now.

Another area that I have seen solidify and grow this year has been ministry with young professionals. My wife Sarah and I have lead this group called the Sojourners. We have held a book group and several fun gatherings, including brunches and picnics in the park. The group is less formalized (i.e., we intentionally have no regular time of meeting monthly). Rather, the special events we have held have served to help those in this age-group

get to know one another better as we are in the minority overall among the broader population of the parish.

I have also continued to collaborate with Steve O'Connor and others in planning and leading Eventide on Wednesday nights. Seeing this service blossom has been a great joy of mine, as well as a fun creative outlet musically, liturgically, and homiletically. The fellowship that occurs during the meal that concludes the service has become incredibly nourishing.

Nancy Bullock and I have continued co-leading the Firesiders program for college-age young adults every second Sunday of the month. We have had very small numbers, but the conversations are always stimulating. It has been a case of quality, not quantity.

Working with the other churches of M-4 has continued to be a special area of ministry for me. This year, we attempted an ambitious and fairly conceptual challenge of doing a "Walk for Water" in which we were to carry heavy water containers to experience what people in many parts of the world have to do daily to acquire the water they need for their families to live. Our goal was to educate ourselves about the need for clean, accessible water, and, more importantly, to raise the money to build at least one well in Ethiopia. I became the point person of sorts for this large event, as All Saints was designated the host and much of the planning occurred during Father Jeff's sabbatical. We pulled

off a joy-filled, inspiring event that raised enough money among our four churches to build nearly four wells! The work of M-4 is important, as we are coming together as one body of Christ with one baptism, bridging our differences across denominations to do meaningful work together.

Other continuing areas of ministry have been pastoral visits, growing and solidifying the acolyte program (recruiting, training, and writing the new manual for acolytes), coordinating the All Saints seminary scholarship committee, and doing frequent weddings, baptisms, and funerals, as well as mid-week Eucharists on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and monthly Eucharists at Casa Dorinda and Valle Verde (which happen on a shared rota with the other priests.)

I cannot believe that my time at All Saints is about to come to an end. It has been a joy-filled two-and-a-half years of ministry and learning. Thanks to the support and wisdom of the lay leaders and other clergy—especially Father Jeff—I feel ready to step into the next chapter of my vocation as a priest as I move on to become rector of St. Dunstan's in Carmel Valley. While I will be gone soon, I will always hold All Saints in my heart as a place that formed me and blessed me in innumerable ways, and to whom I have a tremendous sense of gratitude and love.

A Report from The Rev. Elizabeth Hendrick

It has been a privilege for me to be part of the action at All Saints during the past year. In areas of Outreach, Adult Formation and Women's' Ministries, we have shared knowledge, stories, laughter, food, prayers and, oh yes, participated in the goal of being Christ's hands and feet in the world.

Outreach

The successful Camper Park bathroom project with the other M-4 churches was an early indication that 2009 would be a busy one for All Saints. The bathroom renovation project took four Saturdays in February to complete, and involved significant numbers of parishioners from all four parishes (All Saints, ELMO Presbyterian, Montecito Covenant and Mt. Carmel Catholic). Even a pouring rain on the first Saturday could not discourage those who were dedicated to making a difference in the lives of the Camper park residents. The collaboration resulted in new paint both inside and out, new tiles for floor and shower, new countertops and sinks and a new folding table in the laundry. There were so many volunteers that other work projects were added, including painting the lines for the basketball area and removing parts from abandoned trailers for recycling.

In May, many members of the parish, both golfers and non-golfers alike, turned out to support the annual Jim Bower golf tournament. The weather was perfect and the participants enthusiastic. Father Rob and I played golf and Father Jeff oversaw the action from a roving golf cart! There were over 100 people involved in making the golf tournament a success and it (literally) paid off – approximately \$64,000 was the net amount donated to the All Saints Outreach program.

In July, several parishioners joined David Boyd in starting a food distribution program in Carpinteria. The fresh produce is provided by Food Bank of Santa Barbara, and is provided at no charge to all who show up on the fourth

Wednesday of the month at the Main Family Resource Center in Carpinteria. The program is popular with both volunteers and local families. The volunteers off-load the produce from the truck, create portion-size bags of smaller items, and then assist families in selecting the product. The families in turn receive fresh produce at no cost and assist the volunteers in learning the Spanish names for each of the items!

In October, All Saints participated with the other M-4 churches and World Vision International in the Walk for Water project. Over 200 volunteers registered to help raise funds to build clean-water wells in Ethiopia. Through presentation videos and by carrying a container of water from the beach to the church, participants were able to get an idea of the incredible amount of work required for families in Ethiopia to find and transport water to their homes, and even then, we would not call it "clean" water by Western standards. Drilling wells for clean water in countries like Ethiopia is a tangible way to improve lives and reduce death from water-born diseases. The funds collected in this outing, over \$10,000 from All Saints alone, were matched, so that the total available to build wells was almost \$50,000! Look for more information about this work to be available later this year.

November saw the return of the Gifts of Grace program. The Outreach Committee selected seven organizations to be featured in the Gifts of Grace catalog, and new leader Pamela Hawes, assisted by Leslie Lewis Sigler, Karen Pick, and Kay Lee, went to work. In lieu of individual presentations from each charity, the team organized a Gifts of Grace fair on the second Sunday of Advent, and invited all charities to participate. Participation in the fair, held between services, was robust, and

the program netted almost \$10,000 for the seven charities.

Adult Formation

We began 2009 by expanding the Wednesday morning Adult Forum to include Wednesday nights, following the Eventide service. We started the year with the Nooma video series, led by Father Rob. These videos, written and produced by Rob Bell, provide reflections on scripture as seen in a contemporary setting. The Lenten program offered stories of Christian witness from both parishioners and community leaders. Stories were provided by Tony Askew, Bob Failing, Santa Barbara Police Chief Cam Sanchez, Barry Lang, Ken Larson, Habitat for Humanity Director Joyce McCullough, Marni McGee, Denny Bacon, and Brother Joseph, from Mt. Calvary.

During the summer months, the new program Brown Bag and Book moved adult formation to noon on Wednesday, where parishioners gathered to share lunch and read and discuss a new book each month. The first selection was "Gift of the Jews", by Thomas Cahill, followed by "The Shack" by William Paul Young. The book that seemed to generate the most discussion was "The Language of God", by the new head of the National Institute of Health, Dr. Francis Collins. The program proved so popular that there is a good chance it will be back this summer!

At the beginning of September, we discussed the outcome of the General Convention, held in

Anaheim in July. In October, Father Jeff led a six week study of the Gospel of Luke. We finished the year with a three week program on Advent and the Arts, led by three wonderful and talented All Saints parishioners. Walter Hansen began the series with a discussion of art and the Old Testament predictions of a Messiah; Judy Larson followed with a presentation of art and the mother of Jesus; Tony Askew led discussions where various All Saints artists spoke about the season of Advent and their own work.


In December, we also expanded our spiritual formation options, offering Centering Prayer in between services on the first and third Sunday of the month, complementing Healing Prayer, which is offered in the same time slot on the second and fourth Sundays. In addition to these programs, we continue with Sunday lectionary study, so now there is a choice of adult formation offerings available on Sundays between services. Along with the weekly men and women's Bible study, All Saints offers a variety of programs to help members grow in their faith.

Women's Ministry

In October, All Saints held the second annual Women's Potluck Brunch, with more than 40 women attending. The guest speaker was Betsy Kain, sharing stories and photos of her experiences in Africa.

The theme of the Advent retreat was "Empty Vessels, Full Hearts." Twenty-five women met at the home of Barbara and Tony Askew to explore the idea of making ourselves vessels where God may dwell. There was food, prayer and sharing, along with guest artists who helped the participants make their own ideas of empty vessels out of clay.

Welcoming Committee Report

This has been a successful year for the Newcomer Program. Many positive changes have been made to adapt to the needs of the participants in the Newcomer classes. We held two series of Welcoming Classes in the Spring and Fall for Newcomers to learn about the programs at All Saints and opportunities to become involved.

In May, the Confirmands and interested Newcomers were invited to participate in an all day retreat and a reception following the Confirmation on May 17, 2009. There were 15 attendees. The October/November program was dedicated to welcoming a very interested and diverse group. There were 16 attendees for the 2 sessions. The class was designed to inform participants about the educational, spiritual, outreach, social and stewardship opportunities that exist at All Saints. The Fall Newcomer participants received The Episcopal Handbook, which was positively received. It seems to clearly answer many questions related to the church, traditions and situations.

Each Sunday two parishoners who have volunteered to be Greeters, welcome visitors and other All Saints members before and after services. As the Newcomer Coordinator, I personally welcome everyone at the sign of the peace and at the Welcome Table during coffee hour.

With the staff's assistance, I updated the Welcome books and the member data

There were over 180 visitors to the church in 2009; 89 signed the guest book, 68 signed pew cards and 56 people (including children) have become members of All Saints and several have made pledges.

At the beginning of the year, the Sunday School Design Team changed its name to the Godly Play Design Team to reflect the profound influence that Godly Play has had on all of us. In 2009 the Design Team continued to work together in many areas of ministry: formation, worship, outreach and community building.

Formation

Sunday School classes met during the first part of the 10:00 a.m. service, then children and mentors joined their families in church for communion. During the school year, classes for children from age four through sixth grade followed the Godly Play method of Christian formation. In weekly sessions led by trained storytellers and doorkeepers, children experienced the sacred stories of God's people, the parables of Jesus and the liturgical action stories of the Anglican tradition. Even though our class for three year olds used a different curriculum, their mentors incorporated many Godly Play practices into their lessons. On Sunday mornings children were encouraged to come to church early and join our music leaders for singing at 9:45 a.m. During the summer, we combined our classes into two groups (3-6 year olds and 7-12 year olds) and focused our sessions on outreach and art, inviting parishioners to share their interests and talents with the groups.

During Epiphany our 2nd-6th grade classes met together for an extraordinary four-week series: "Focus on Africa, Focus on Art." Jacqui Owitti, a Christian artist from Kenya, and All Saints parishioner Betsy Kain shared their stories and talents with the group and gave the children an opportunity to express their faith on canvas.

Throughout the year childcare was available in the Baby/Toddler Room on Sunday mornings from 9:00 a.m. to noon, on Wednesday evenings for Eventide and adult formation classes, and for several parish events.

Also in the area of Christian formation, the Design Team offered devotional booklets and calendars for the seasons of Lent and Advent to the parish.

Worship

Over the course of the year, the Godly Play Design Team helped to shape our worship experience and invited children to participate. On the first Sunday in Lent, children buried the alleluia banner in the garden as a reminder that we don't say alleluia during Lent. When the alleluias returned at Easter, the banner was unearthed and brought back into church. At the children's services on Easter Eve and Christmas Eve, children served as acolytes, read the lessons, led the prayers, and helped tell the Godly Play Easter and Christmas stories. On the Day of Pentecost, children led the procession into church waving red flags and streamers to symbolize tongues of fire. Throughout the season of Advent children lit the Advent wreath at the 10:00 a.m. service, and on the fourth Sunday of Advent they presented a very special gift to the congregation—an amazing Christmas Pageant!

The Design Team also developed a Godly Play "Liturgy of the Word" to be used for Children's Chapel in the Parish Hall. Last year we held Children's Chapel on two Sunday mornings: one to mark the end of the school year and one to celebrate St. Francis Day. Children

participated in both services, then processed into church to join their families for communion.

Outreach

The Design Team coordinated the Lenten "Hope Chest" offering to support NetsforLife, a partnership working to prevent the spread of malaria in Africa. The team also made children's stewardship envelopes available to families. In Sunday School our children participated in several outreach projects. They made cards for the members of Friendship Center, baked cookies and decorated vases for Transition House, designed Easter cards and Christmas cards for home-bound parishioners and created a friendship book for the Arab Evangelical Episcopal School in Palestine.

Community Building

In November the Design Team hosted

an inter-generational Advent Workshop, offering participants an opportunity to make Advent wreaths for their homes. In May the team hosted the annual parish picnic at Lower Manning Park, where parishioners of all ages enjoyed good food and fellowship.

Looking back over the past year, I am extremely grateful to our clergy, vestry and staff, our Godly Play Design Team, our Sunday School mentors and substitutes, our children's music leaders, our childcare staff, and the many parishioners who have supported and encouraged the young people of All Saints-by-the-Sea. What a blessing it is to serve with you!

Their expertise and commitment to our early childhood education program are invaluable.

Also key to the success of any educational program is parent involvement. Our active Parent Council generously and enthusiastically supports our school all year through. Teri is the Director of Storyteller Children's Center in Santa Barbara and we are so happy to have her join us.
